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INNOVATION

Dancing Classrooms Philly is thankful to all of our supporters who helped us weather the COVID-19 pandemic. Not only were we able to adapt and pivot to virtual learning through Homeroom Edition, the virtual adaption of our flagship program, but also by expanding our social dance offerings to different genres beyond ballroom and to additional age groups, Now, in addition to the 5th and 8th grade students that participate in the DCP Ballroom Dance Residency, students in 3rd through 12th grade can also learn Latin, Salsa, Hip Hop, and K-Pop, in school assemblies or classroom-based residencies. We also added after-school dance clubs, which give students and their families the opportunity to share the joy of movement beyond the classroom (sometimes outdoors), and enjoy the benefits of physical daily activity.

By the end of the 2020-21 school year, we brought 706 Ballroom, Hip-Hop, Latin, and K-Pop residency and assembly sessions to 39 locations serving 3,408 students, despite NO Fall programming. Thirty classrooms participated in the Homeroom Edition virtual ballroom residency. Of the total students served, 82 were special needs students via 69 sessions at 4 locations. Six additional students participated in 23 virtual and in-person DCP Academy sessions.

The Dancing Classrooms Philly (DCP) mission is to foster self-esteem, social awareness and joy in children by providing the opportunity to learn and perform social dance. DCP envisions transformative arts programs in all school communities, building confidence, nurturing creativity, and promoting a culture of mutual respect and well-being.

Dancing Classrooms Philly is committed to teaching the whole student and believes that every child deserves to find joy, respect, and a safe space at school. Dancing Classrooms' methodology focuses on using rigorous and joyful social dance as a vehicle to enhance students' mental and emotional well-being through opportunities for improved decision-making, goal-setting, communication, relationship-building, identifying and managing emotions, self-motivation and reflection.

Through our social dance instruction, we help to improve the climate of school communities across the Philadelphia region by building confidence in students, breaking down social barriers, and inspiring respect for all individuals.

Dear Friends,

It is an honor and privilege to begin my service as Executive Director of Dancing Classrooms Philly (DCP) and partner organization Musicopia. While it has been a challenging year for all, I am thankful for the strong organizational foundation that allows us to confidently reemerge, poised for growth.

Jane Brooks, Joyce Burd, and Harvey Kimmel brought Dancing Classrooms to Philadelphia in 2007, and under Denise Kinney's leadership as Executive Director from 2012-2020, the organization has truly blossomed. Denise created a clear vision for partnership with Musicopia, led the formation and cultivation of a shared Board of Directors, and built solid relationships with supporters and school partners. Along the way, Denise discovered a deep appreciation for dance! Under her leadership we offered collaborative opportunities between DCP student dancers and Musicopia student musicians; the DCP Academy grew to three sites; and we welcomed the inaugural DCP Academy Festival that brought students and communities together from around the region. Denise was also a champion for inclusion in the classroom, piloting ballroom residencies with gender neutral circles.

This has been an extraordinary year. I am amazed by the resiliency of our Teaching Artists, school partners, and staff who worked tirelessly to meet the varying needs of our schools and students. After a pause in programming from March-October 2020, we came back in full (virtual) force, broadening school-based dance offerings to include not only a wider range of social dance styles including Salsa and Hip-hop among others, but also a wider range of students from 3rd to 12th graders! Knowing the importance of our community as a whole, we also piloted professional development workshops for classroom teachers and administrators. As we return focus in 2021 to in-person lessons and our flagship ballroom residencies, we will carry forward much of this innovation into the future.

An accomplishment this year that makes me especially proud was the creation of our Board of Directors' Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) Committee. The DEI Committee is tasked with the focused integration of formal DEI policies and initiatives into all areas of our organizations and programming, deepening our commitment to equitable access to arts education.

I am eternally grateful for the Board of Directors' belief in my vision for the future of DCP. My avid pursuit of ballroom dance and Argentine tango as a young adult not only shaped my personal future, but also my passion for DCP. I am also thankful for you – our supporters, community members, and friends – for your continued engagement and support throughout this virtual year. We have seen again and again that dance brings children together and transforms lives. Your partnership in this journey makes all the difference in shaping the youth of our collective future. In September 2020, the shared **Dancing Classrooms Philly/ Musicopia Board of Directors** appointed Catherine Charlton as the new Executive Director. The appointment took place after a thoughtful and rigorous transition process upon the retirement of Denise Kinney. Catherine served as DCP's and Musicopia's Grants & Corporate **Development Director from** 2017-2020. Earlier in her career, she served as Assistant Vice President in Market **Research and technology** management for a global credit card company. She holds a B.S. in Engineering with Distinction and a minor in Music. and an Executive **Certificate in Financial Success** for NonProfits. from Cornell University, A recording artist on the prestigious roster of **Steinway Artists, Catherine** currently serves on the **Board of Governors of the Philadelphia Chapter of the Recording Academy. She is** also an avid enthusiast of **ballroom and Argentine tango** and taught ballroom dance to vouth in West Philadelphia.

SCHOOL Programming

From March-October 2020, DCP paused classes due to COVID-19 school shutdowns. This sabbatical from programming allowed for time to re-invent curriculum for virtual delivery, in collaboration with Dancing Classrooms Global, as well as to bolster the long-term financial stability of the organization. Furloughed teaching artists received support from staff in finding available financial resources, and also received grants from the Board of Directors' established Emergency Response Fund. Staff from partner organization Musicopia assisted with administrative tasks during this transition.

In-school Residency

In November 2020, DCP began offering the Homeroom Edition virtual residency. Delivered via video conferencing, live instructional sessions alternate with video sessions, in which the entire class watches original videos with DCP teaching artists offering verbal instruction and check-ins in real-time on a variety of ballroom dances including foxtrot, rumba, swing, tango, waltz, and merengue. Follow-up assignments, opportunities for teacher input and feedback, and curricular connections allow for multiple touch points. Throughout the residency, students are asked to journal, write poems, draw, and reflect about the specific dances. These reflections encourage self-expression and promote creative and imaginative ways for the students to enter the spirit and cultural history of the dances. The Homeroom Edition residency reinforces the DCP core curriculum components: respect and compassion, being present, creating a safe space, command and control, language, and humor and joy.

Our first virtual program was a game-changer for our students and organization. It was proof that, **yes, we can teach dance virtually!** It enabled us to engage our students to move, think, feel, and connect during a very confusing, isolating, unpredictable time in their young lives.

In the 2020-21 school year, DCP also broadened its school-based dance offerings to include not only a wider range of dance styles, but also a wider range of students. Now, students in 3rd through 12th grades can participate in a Latin dance (Merengue, Rumba, Salsa, ChaCha), Hip-Hop, or K-Pop assembly, classroom residency, or after school dance clubs.





"The virtual program has been great for our 5th graders. It has given the students an outlet to express themselves through movement and dance during a time when we all are unfortunately very sedentary, and opportunity for activities outside of school is low. Programming for Students with Special Needs

DCP works with several special needs schools to serve students with cognitive, sensory, mobility, psychological, and developmental disabilities. Teaching artists use descriptive language to convey movements, which is especially useful for blind and visually impaired students. as well as for virtual instruction where students see a mirror image of the instructor. Individual adaptations are created for each student's range of motion. If students are confined to stationary positions due to mobility issues, rhythm and spatial pattern exercises are reconfigured to highlight and activate "small body geographies," working

the rhythm of each dance through movements of the eyes, head, shoulders, ribs and chest, hips, knees, and feet.

DCP staff, teaching artists, and school staff, students, student personal aides, and parents of students learning from home worked collaboratively to figure out how to best teach and learn social dance virtually. At one school, the DCP teaching artist taught live virtual sessions from home to students and aides, some of whom were located at the school building, and others who learned from home. Our special needs programming reaches school-age students as well as adult students.

IN-SCHOOL INNOVATIONS!

Our new Social and Emotional Learning (SEL) Workshops allow teachers to experience a variety of techniques and tools in their classrooms that support mindfulness, create a safe space, use humor and joy, and instill respect and compassion. In March and May, 45 teachers from Aldan Elementary School and Colwyn Elementary School participated in three DCP-led SEL workshops. Some of the comments we heard were "great energy," "great stretching exercise, I will continue to use this method," and "best meeting everrrrrrrrrrr!"


Virtual Culminating Events

Virtual peer-to-peer sharing in celebration of student work and live family-friendly dance parties enable school communities to lift up students and connect families over long distances. At the conclusion of in-school residencies, students invited their families, friends, and caretakers into the virtual ballroom to reflect on their experiences, share their artwork and poetry, and demonstrate their new dance moves! In 2020-21, 17 schools, including three special needs schools, held live virtual culminating events, sharing performances with school communities through videos, broadcast of performances from classrooms, and live video conferencing.

Colors of the Rainbow Team Match Events

The Colors of the Rainbow Team Match Events are joyful occasions that bring together DCP school communities to celebrate student learning, effort, and resilience and help children from different backgrounds realize that they are all part of a larger family, united in their love of ballroom dance. Relationships are built and strengthened, and adults and children cheer each other on with elegance and good sportsmanship. Due to state and school health and safety guidelines and protocols to mediate the COVID-19 pandemic, Dancing Classrooms Philly was unable to hold Team Match Events in the 2020-21 school year; however, we look forward to cheering on our students as they perform in these events in the future.

OPPORTUNITIES Beyond the Classroom

The DCP Academy and DCP Allstars, open to in-school residency graduates, provide an outlet for our students to become more engaged in dance and to share their love of dance with others.

DCP Academy

The DCP Academy is a weekly program during the school year, open to all in-school residency graduates. Academy students receive more advanced training through a curriculum designed to challenge them with a focus on refined techniques to boost them to the next level, while nurturing confidence, motivation, discipline, and performance quality. While having the opportunity to meet peers from other schools and develop lifelong friendships, students also receive introduction to new dances from different cultures, and exposure to the civility, social manners, and elegance expected in adult life.

In 2020-21, 6 Academy students danced in-person together on Saturday mornings, following COVID-19 mediation protocols at the University City Arts League in West Philadelphia, and virtually in December and January. In December, Academy dancers were featured in a highlights video during our annual High Note High Step Event, and in March, the dancers performed live outdoors at Smith Memorial Playground's Play-A-Palooza. The dancers also made a video dancing the Swing to be used in partnership with a video performance by the University of Pennsylvania Honor Band.

ACADEMY INNOVATIONS! Thanks to a Penn Medicine CAREs grant, we were able to purchase new speakers, microphones, and practice shoes for our Academy students. These tools enabled the students to train and rehearse outside while adhering to COVID-19 protocols.



Under Catherine Charlton's leadership as Board President, the Dancing **Classroom Philly and Musicopia** shared Board of Directors created the Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) Committee, led by Co-Chairs Scott Fast and Dr. Dennis W. Creedon. This committee includes Board representatives from Programming (including active school Principals and Teaching Artists), Finance, **Development and Marketing, and** Governance. Having begun with a DEI pulse survey of the Board in June 2021. the committee will survey stakeholders to assess all aspects of Musicopia's and **DCP's programming. Board** recruitment, HR policies, messaging, and more, with the intent to integrate a DEI lens into formal policies and strategic goals throughout the organizations. The April 2021 Board and Staff Retreat featured keynote facilitator Mauricio Velásquez of the **Diversity Training Group, and staff** participated in a June 2021 workshop on internal bias, with David Dylan Thomas.

The pause in programming due to COVID-19, in addition to ensuring long-term financial stability of the organization by preserving cash reserves, allowed space for additional internal focus and process improvements. As a result, DCP started holding monthly teaching artists meetings to allow time for community building, professional development, and creating curriculum for the new dance offerings. We also converted our accounting and payroll systems, completed a Human Resources manual overhaul, and began further leveraging Salesforce for customer relationship & data management.

In this role,** Swati oversees DCP's day-to-day programming operations, guides the talented roster of teaching artists, and creates and deepens relationships with schools and partner organizations. Swati is the founder and director of the **Community Bollywood Dance** Project, and since 2014, has served as a Teaching Artist for partner organization Musicopia. In that role, she brings a successful Bollywood Dance Assembly and Residency program to schools and communities across the Delaware Valley.
